Sunday Aug 9th.

Heavy rain all night. River up 2' 6".

Party of four to Sty Head Tarn in the morning, odd walks, church etc.

Afternoon: - One party with H.H.S. up to Lobstone Bant, by the old quarries, & to top of Scawfell Fell: tea in the gap between Chat & Maiden Moor: down thro' scree & bracken to Borrowdale, just below the Birches up the river between Castle Crag & the river - a route not to be recommended, as the path is only intermittent & very swampy. - 'Beginners' party with ^{W.H.S.} up Castle Crag.

Five aftⁿ, following wet morning.

Evening, sing-song.

Monday Aug 10th: The whole party, with H.H.S. & H.E.W. left at 10.15 for Langdale Pikes.

Walked through one hour's continuous rain from Stonehewite to foot of Stake: all struck it finely. Lunch at top of Stake. Sharbly before

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the top of Pike o' Stickle (1.45 pm) the rain
came blazing - but the clouds lifted once or
twice; splendid views down to Langdale. H.F.W. &
the smaller ones returned by the Stake & as
before: H.H.S. & ten by Thunauer Knott, High
Raine & Greenup edge. The clouds lifted:
an afternoon in a thousand. NB; the High
Raine ridge - which is not much to look at -
gives the best central view in Lakeland, as
no side is blocked out by any higher fell
near by - everything can be seen in a circle
all round: Conistone Old Man, Bowfell, S. Pike,
Pillar, Gable, Buttermere Fells, Skiddaw &
Blencathra, Helvellyn ridge, Rydal Fells
& full length of Windermere. Every camp
party ought to do this ridge walk.


Tues August 11th. First day. H.F.W. & half
day party went up Homister after dinner
with several cameras, & up the trolley
track to the summit behind Fleetwith.

He with H.H.S. left at 10.45 by Sty Head
to Great End (up the shoulder which
comes down to Sty Head - grass, rock, &
short crag - a first rate scramble, safe
for any able bodied person, with fine views
into Gable & Kirk Fell): top of Great End,

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after lunching half way up, at 1.15. P. on to
St. Pike (H.H.S. returned, start of Broad Crag):
some cloud; back by Allen Crag & Glaramara;
[this ridge walk has lovely views of the Coniston
fells. The top is very humpy (& tiring) rock. The
descent, with Combe on the right, by the left
shoulder of Glaramara, needs reasonable care]

Sir Francis & Lady Danson came to tea at
4pm; & ^{were} entertained to scones, & inspection of the
premises, by H.H.S. [Signatures to follow]. Sir F.
left £5 to be used for some kind of a beans.

Wed^d Aug 12

Thirty six hours rain from Tues/Wed.
right to Thursday. Some new gramophone records of H.E.W.'s
arrived on Wed day, with relieved feeling — especially "It
ain't gonna rain no more" as played by the bands of Boys
Scouts, Salvation Army, & the Guards. In the aftⁿ
H.H.S. & party of eight walked over the Honister as
far as the lake, & back: tea eaten standing, under
the lee of a wall. High wind: splendid spate in the
becks. — General good temper & good spirits, in
spite of a trying day.

Thursday Aug 13th Rain over by noon. Most

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started for Emmerdale, by Scarth Gap, with H.H.S. (a few
to Keswick). Gatescaith 2 pm. Top of Scarth Gap
2.50; from here the main party came home, under
Christie. A party of 5 went on & climbed the
Pillar Mountain - H.H.S., Burnham, Parry, Emrys Williams
& Dobson, *quo nomine honoris causa*. Reached
bridge over Emmerdale Beck 3.30. Over looking
stead into thick mist, but with splendid views,
all the way to top of Pillar, down the gully on
Emmerdale side. Tea at Summit 5-5.30; the
mist was kept & gave us a full length view
down Emmerdale Lake. On the way down the
mists lifted & we had wonderful sunset
effects among drifting clouds on the fell
tops, all the way to top of Homister. Return
route from foot of Black Sail up Green
Tongue (there is a foot track up it for most
of the way, wending through the moraine heaps),
cross down over Green Tongue Beck to the left
near the top of the rise - (which leads between
Green Gable & Brandreth) - & so half-left
to top of Brandreth, then along the ridge
to Grey Knotts & ~~Widd~~ of Homister House. In
at 9.10 pm. - This walk shd be done
for all really good walkers, tho' not by
by all really good walkers, tho' not by
others. Time 9 hours+. - Anyone who

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knows the way, & the guiding cairn just after the main Pillar M^s ascent begins, & take a party of 4 or 5 by the "High Level Route" to the foot of Pillar Rock (from ^{head of} which there is a track up to head of Pillar M^s). This route is perfectly safe if you have a good head, & is the finest crag walk in Cumberland: take no fools.

Friday Aug 14th. Fine day: clouds rather low. H.E.W. & party raised the level of the washing beach with stones (& during the day a fatigue party of 3 paved this beach with best York paving, fastened towel rail, & dug a new sanitary pit).

J.A. Thomas sent home for bad discipline: don't have him next year, if still in the school.

H.E.W. & party to Homister House, Bultmore Villages, Bultmore Moss, Robinson, Dale Head. Some good sun, & a few bilberries.

H.H.S. & party to Hom. House, trolley track (then striking up straight to left: don't follow the track, which keeps too low, beneath Brentwith etc & misses the best full length view of the lakes north-west), Grey Knotts, Brendeth, Green Gable: bench, fine view of the Earncliffe face of Gable. To top of Gable: $\frac{1}{2}$ hour in thick mist, off by compass via Aaron's Slack, between Gable & Green Gable.

M. Thorpe came in to tea - on motor cycle from Lakeside. Mr & Mrs S.V. Brown to dinner, & breakfast on Saty, having walked over from Boot. S.V.B. & H.H.S. interviewed Jopson at Chapel Farm, about paying a farmer rent for use of the field & about damages to wall by wooden bridge & about a right of way to the bathing pool beyond the wooden bridge.

Saturday Aug. 15th. Fine day. Fouliss Maddock left on bicycles, 7.30 am, for home. Rice left by the motor 1.4.5. Baxter¹⁰ arrived at H.H.S. left at noon to walk over to Boot [postal address, Bird How, Boot (only). Tele-graphic address, Symonds, Birdhow, Eskdale]

Camp Committee of 3(?) to be elected each Saty evs in future.

A quiet afternoon followed, as all the chief disturbers of the peace had gone. Six of the boys climbed up High Knott, in order to find a suitable place in which to read. They failed to reach the top, as on resting at a height of 800 ft, they all fell asleep. Pickup^{in his sleep} achieved a Highland Fling attitude that should have been recorded with a camera.

At tea, the Camp was favoured by a visit: Miss Hudson, and a gentleman introduced as her brother, looked in for a moment. * H.E.W. with tactful absence of mind, forgot to ask for the visitor's signatures.

The fresh contingent arrived a little before 7.0 p.m., and consisted of:-

The newcomers, perhaps because of the fine sunny evening, evinced far more energy than those that came in, the previous Saturday. Robson & Tyler climbed High Knott after dinner; Austin & Vaughan under the guidance of Rowland walked to Horster House. The Camp Committee was discussed, but election postponed until morning. Williams E was appointed to be Chief Organist of the Gramophone (when it returns from the menders: its second visit in 3 days) and Price, Assistant-Organist; no one is to touch this Musical (sic) Instrument but these two. Gramophone & Records are to be kept in Staff cubicle, and close seasons for the Gramophone are to be declared at the option of the Staff-in-Charge or the Camp Committee. The end of a perfect day!

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Sunday Aug 16th. Cold morning with heavy dew; Sunny day without a cloud; considerable heat and no wind. Fell-climbing spirit still high: Peter Bradbury and Baxter E.O. walked to Honister House before breakfast. Immediately after breakfast, "Peter", Redington, Smith LNS., Baxter E.O. & Burnham climbed Dalehead via Honister returning by High Scawdell. As Burnham's watch was an hour fast, the party ran back in order to be in time for lunch and just managed to be 55 minutes early. Another party, - Baxter, A.D., Stephenson, Tunnington, Cashin's piers, Austin, Smith, J.S. & Williams, E. climbed High Knott; Vaughan accompanied them half-way. Howard & Makin went down to the Bowder Stone & on to Lodore Falls. Melner, Tyler & Robson climbed High Scawdell. After this burst of energy, it was not astonishing that the hot afternoon induced practically all the boys to spend their time in the Bathing pool.

Quiet evening & sing-song. Peter's Banjo, both at the Bathing-pool & at the Camp was a great asset. Another perfect day.

H.E.W. 16.8.25.

Monday, Aug 17th Mist in the morning, - a little only, - was the fore-runner of an almost cloudless day. Redington, Baxter A.D. & Stephenson, the Camp Cee. elected the previous day (see above. No! don't!) suggested the excursion for the day, and their plan was followed. Nineteen boys & H.E.W. set out by Grains Gill to Esk House. The new-comers did well. Dinner was eaten at Esk House. Then the party divided; six, - Redington, the Baxters, Stephenson, Williams E. & Burnham climbed up Esk Pike & on by Dr's Gap to Bowfell. The Institute cry: "Do! Aa!" etc., was raised by the party on Esk Pike & repeated by the rest on Allen Crags. Only a few neighbouring sheep seemed to be affected by this, the first ^{antiphonal} performance of the School yell in Lakeland.

Kedmyton's party returned by Angle Tarn & Langstrath Gill, practically, following the beck all the way. They regard the name Langstrath as well-chosen. Baxter, E.O. felt unwell, but held out pluckily until they reached Stonethwaite, when two of the party came on in advance for a bicycle for him. He recovered (or seemed to) by "lights out." The rest of the party under H.E.W. came back from Oak House by Alben Crags over Glaramara, & found the stones distinctly annoying. The little tarn, ? High House, - was admired. Descent was made by Thorny Thwaite Fell, along the east slope & through the wood to Mountain View. Two of the boys, Makin & Woodhall had gone in to Keswick for the day. Four others, Robson, Tyler, Briggs & Melner had stayed in Camp; the first two "to fish", the second pair as "not being quite up to the mark". On the return of H.E.W.'s party, they were staggered to hear from the first two that they had been on Scawfell! As the journey was alleged to have taken $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours, scepticism prevailed. It was at last made out, though uncertainty still coloured the account, that the four left behind had started out at 2 o'clock for a climb. They had passed Seathwaite, when the latter pair decided enough had been done for honour. Robson & Tyler, however, seemed to have climbed the Sty-head, seen the Tarn & achieved a little of the slope of Great Gable. Then they returned. It cannot be emphasised enough that casual excursions of the sort are likely to make a great deal of trouble. In any difficulties that are very likely to befall the inexperienced climber, those in charge of the Camp would find their troubles increased merely by ignorance of the route taken.

The day was extremely hot, and fatigue was felt on this account by most of the boys. "Peter" went the round with H.E.W.'s party, and had only a few minutes' interval before the 'bus came by which he left.

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His visit was enjoyed by all in the Camp; he is a perfect acquisition to any such party. He'll be jolly stiff to-morrow. Another day of irreproachable weather. H.E.W. 17.8.25.

[MEM: Wilson's (the Bakers) seems to be very erratic in the sending-out of bread; on enquiry, I found that the trouble lay with Wood ~~roads~~, who sometimes had left the parcel in the Market-place, after taking it on his conveyance. Query: would not a little palm-oil, - to the chauffeur! - lubricate the machinery well enough?]

Tuesday, Aug. 18th. Another fine day! The only defect was that a heat mist flattened the views. Redington, Burnham, Williams, E., Rowland & Tyler accompanied by Robson, the two Smiths & Briggs went by the Drum House, ^{Flastwith, by the shade of} Brandwith to ~~Scarth Gap~~. ^{by Cran-Tongue to} ~~Scarth Gap~~. ^{Summer Dale} The four last-mentioned returned by ^{Scarth Gap} Buttermere & the Honister. The first-mentioned crossed Emmerdale & climbed The Pillas. Coniston & Wastwater were descried; Ullwater, of the principal lakes, was the only one the party had yet ²⁻¹ not seen. The return route was by Buttermere. Coming up the Honister, the party helped a motor-cyclist in difficulties, & seem to plume themselves on the remembrance of their courtesy. H.E.W. spent the morning in Keswick, reasoning with negligent tradesmen & paying bills. He recommends a visit to the Museum in the Fitz Park on account of the Geological maps & specimens there (though they are not well-arranged). (Let Mr Elliott see this.) Returning by 'Bus, he was induced to act as a guide to the neighbourhood to three lone ladies, and discoursed learnedly (and paternally) to entranced auditors, who took it all in! The rest of the Camp spent a quiet day, - all except Woodhall who was still rather sick. A Mr Feather of Brad ~~ford~~ ^{Supper?} called in after Dinner to ask whether we were going to have a Concert in the evening. This is evidently a tribute to our pianists, for he said he had heard music (sic!) as he passed. He asked to join the morrow's trip: agreed. H.E.W. 18.8.25

Wednesday, Aug. 19th a dull morning, but no rain all day. No sun, too!

An early start was made by a party bound for Keswick: Redington, the 2 Baxters,

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Williams, E., Price, Stephenson, Pickup & Makin. They walked to Keswick, and all but Stephenson climbed Skiddaw. The principal event of the climb seems to have been an exciting race the party had with a "gink" dressed in best flannels & crepe-soled shoes. The Institute won on the post. Baxter E.O., insatiably greedy, did Saddleback as well. At least, he says so. Baxter A.W., Price & Redington walked back and so must have covered nearly 26 miles in the day. The rest returned by 'bus.

All the rest of the party in Camp, save Burnham, Hickinbotham and Woodhall went via Styhead & Wastdale Head to Great Gable, thence by Green Gable, Brandreth, Flectwith & Horister Pass home. Mr Feather accompanied the party and kept H.E.W.'s attention nearly all the way, with some best Yorkshire yarns. (Mr Feather has to do with the Spinning trade). He promised a recipe he had picked up for Westmorland Ginger-bread, which H.E.W. had sampled. He also sang a stave of "On Ilkla moor baat 'at."

On return of the Keswick contingent, the Camp's attention was drawn to a desperate feud between "The Mid-day Follies" and the "Anti-Follies". Truce was declared after a while, but only for a few hours. Woodhall's temperature & pulse were unsatisfactory (101.4 & 120 respectively), so H.E.W. decided that it would be better to get in the Doctor. Dr Crawford of Keswick came, but could not diagnose any exact ailment. He recommended a milk diet until the next day, when he would call again. The boy's condition might be the beginning of something serious, or might be a mere passing "chill", but he considered it needed watching.

Thursday, Aug. 20th A little rain in the night; very misty morning. No sunshine all day. The £5 left by Sir Francis Danson was used to hire a Char-a-banc to take

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most of the boys (+ Miss Roberts & one of the kitchen staff) to Grassmere Sports. As Weylman could not take all, seven of the boys walked there, and six others with H.E.W. walked back. Redington, Williams, E., Smith, L.N.S., Pickup, Tunnington, Braggs & Austin walked there, together with Mr Feather. The party missed their way at Greenup and found themselves walking down Langstrath Dale back again. ^{They arrived at Grassmere after 1 1/2 hrs. walking.} Mr Feather found his own ruck-sack too heavy for his light-weight and Redington shouldered the burden more than half the way. The last two should be mentioned with praise, not only for undertaking this walk when older & stronger boys either flinched, or were unfit, but for uniform willingness to help in all Camp duties. Howard walked, though half of one boot-sole was a pulpy piece of leather, ^{almost} detached from the rest. The Chauffeur of the Char-a-banc drove both ways quickly & safely. A rather rowdy attempt at a Sing-song occupied the last half-hour before beds were made, but H.E.W. counteracted that by playing hymn-tunes while the boys were getting ready for bed & into bed. Woodhall was much fitter. The doctor had been & pronounced him better, - & allowed him to get up and have light food.

It might be mentioned, for guidance of any new-comers that want Plankett to put nails into their boots, that his catch-word is "You see how I'm fixed". If the boys use his catch-word first & steal his thunder, he doesn't ^{know} what to say, and does what he's asked soon. (Cashin, F.A. late on, in some rag, had his head cut on a bucket. D. Crawford, asked to come to stitch the cut, was unable to come at once, but promised to come early in the morning.) H.E.W. 21.8.25

Saturday, Aug. 22nd - A very rainy morning. After breakfast, the "pavilion" was tidied, but owing to the weather, it was not possible to air the beds & blankets. Saturday Aug: 22nd
Except for a short interval about 2 pm the rain continued heavily all day long. Mr. Baxter (father of E.O.) visited the camp about 3 pm & was just leaving when I arrived at 3:15. S.J.E. along with Rooksby, Wynn J.R. & Wynn A.G. came about 7.45 pm making a total of 13.

Cashin F.A (whose head wound seems to be doing well) Winn A.G; Briggs, Milner & myself went to the little parish church where we heard the Archdeacon of Bradford & Canon Stanton Jones. Professor Wilberforce of Liverpool read the lessons.

after dinner Briggs, who had previously complained of a headache, developed a temperature of 103° F & a feverish pulse. I went to Keswick for Dr. Crawford who came about 4 pm. S.J.E & the 3 boys went down with me to Castle Head & returned via Watendlath. S.J.E & Milner bathed before dinner & the 5 boys on

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their return from Langdale.

We are thus reduced to the use of candles, + it is by candlelight I am now writing up this log. W.W.

Conditions were against us, however, + though we had an enjoyable day we only managed to lure 3 small inexperienced trout to their doom.

After dinner the plate was passed round + 10/- realised. There followed the usual Sing Song, Prayers + (for me) the Log
